



FUNDRAISING IDEAS




- Casual Friday: Hold a fundraising day at work where everyone wears casual clothes and donates a gold coin.
- Morning Tea or Luncheon: Ask everyone to bring a plate and a donation.
- Black-Tie Dinner: As above but on a fancier scale and everyone gets to dress up in their best cocktail/evening attire!



- Bunnings BBQ: Apply online to your local Bunnings to host a Bunnings Sausage Sizzle. Bravehearts can provide you with an authority to fundraise letter and a copy of our public liability insurance.
- Backyard Olympics: Combine a BBQ with some 'old-school' games in a local park or the backyard. Games like egg-and-spoon race, sack race, quiots, and three-legged race all work well. Charge a fee to enter each race or have a friendly wager on who will win, with takings going into the donation kitty.



- Sponsored Ride, Walk, Skate, Scooter or Cycle: Ask participants on the day to bring along a nominated amount to donate.
- Garage Sale: Gather up all that stuff you don't need and ask your friends and family to do the same.






- Lolly–Jar Guessing Competition: Charge a gold coin donation per guess. Gather people's guesses in your community, making a record of each one. The person whose guess is the closest to the actual number of lollies in the jar wins the whole jar!
- Bake Sale: Bake cookies or cupcakes and sell them at your workplace to raise funds. Better yet, ask your colleagues if they'd be willing to bring a plate also to donate to the cause.



- Silent Auction: Host a silent auction with prizes donated by local businesses.
- Crazy Tie/Socks/Hair Day: Charge your colleagues a gold coin to come in wearing their loudest tie, craziest sock or worst hair do. Award the winner.





- Book Sale: Sell old books, collected from everyone you know.
- Film Night: Have a movie night in a community centre, get the projector out and a screen, supply popcorn and refreshments. Charge everyone a fee for entry and for refreshments.
- Community art exhibition: Contact local artists and hold an art exhibition in your local community hall. Ask one of the artists to donate a piece and auction it off to raise extra funds.

- Celebration Giving: Ask your friends and family for donations in lieu of presents for a celebration such as a birthday, wedding or engagement.
- Hour of Pay: Ask your friends and family to donate just one hour of their pay to your fundraiser (don't forget to pledge an hour of pay yourself!).
- Pre-Loved Clothing Swap: Ask your friends and colleagues to bring along their unwanted clothes. Charge a fee to fill a bag.




- Amazing Race: Organise an Amazing Race style challenge and charge participants a donation to enter a team.
- Trivia Night: Organise a trivia night for your friends and/or work collegues and charge a nominal amount for each team to enter.



- Bottle and Can Drive: Ask everyone in your workplace, school or neighbourhood to collect their recyclable bottles and cans for a month, then take your collection to your local recycling centre and exchange for cash.
- Paper Airplane Competition: This is a fun one for workplaces! Get a local business to donate first prize and charge an entry fee to the competition. You could have different categories for prizes too, such as 'most creative design', 'longest flight' and 'fastest flight'.





Community Car Wash: The community car wash is a classic! People love the idea

• Karaoke Night: Ask your local pub or club to donate their stage and equipment and host your own karaoke fundraising night, either as a general 'open mic' or a competition with prizes.







 Rubber Ducky Toss: Find a wide open space and get hold of a vast amount of rubber ducks. You could either set up a target, and award a prize to the person who throws a duck the closest OR the furthest. Use sticky labels on the bottom of each duck to assign them a number, and note down each contestant's name and contact details against the number of their duck.
